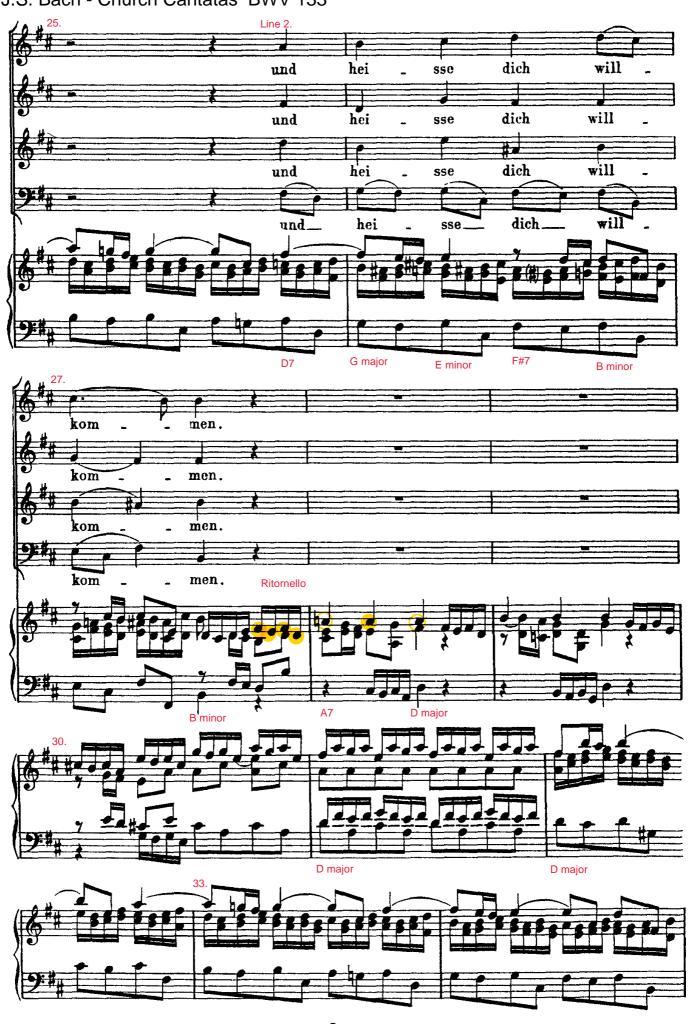
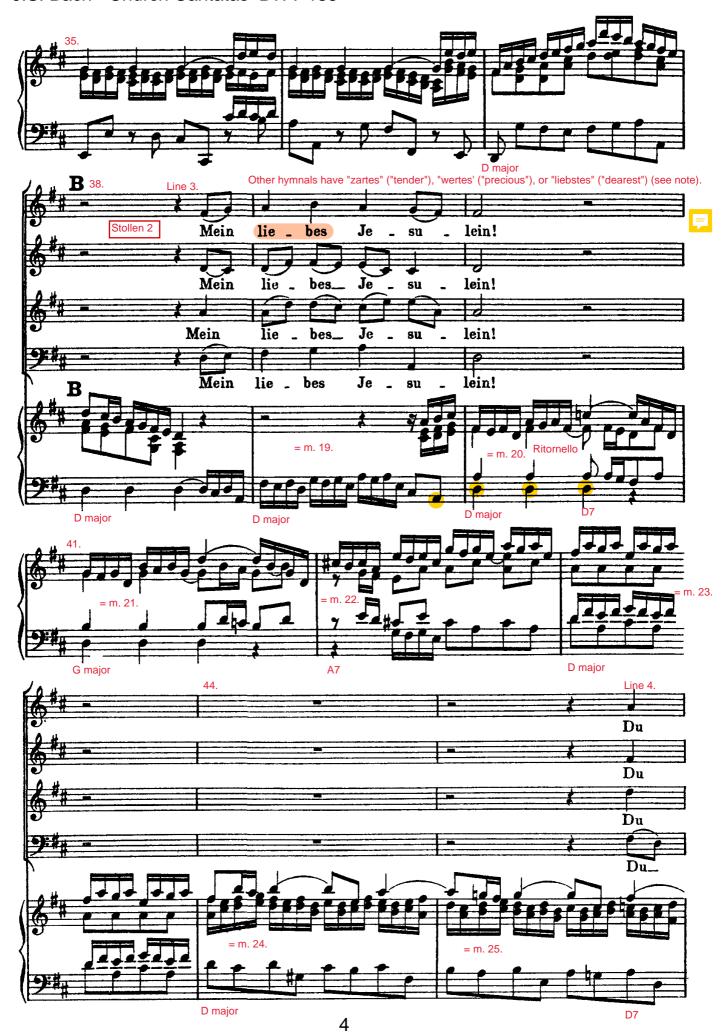

The underlying chorale by Caspar Ziegler (1621–1690), published after his death, was usually sung to other melodies. The ca. 1714 tune used here was apparently little known. Perhaps that is why Bach notated it at the bottom of a sketch of the Sanctus first performed on Christmas Day in 1724 and later incorporated in his Mass in B minor. Usually Bach used older chorales. In 133/4, unity of affect gives way to Bach's interest in a differentiated portrayal of individual text passages. In this da capo aria for sopprano, the whole B section is without continuo. Bach often uses *bassetto* technique (removing continuo support) to depict something heavenly, unearthly, incomprehensible, or without foundation. Here it symbolizes how incomprehensible the poet finds hard-hearted people.





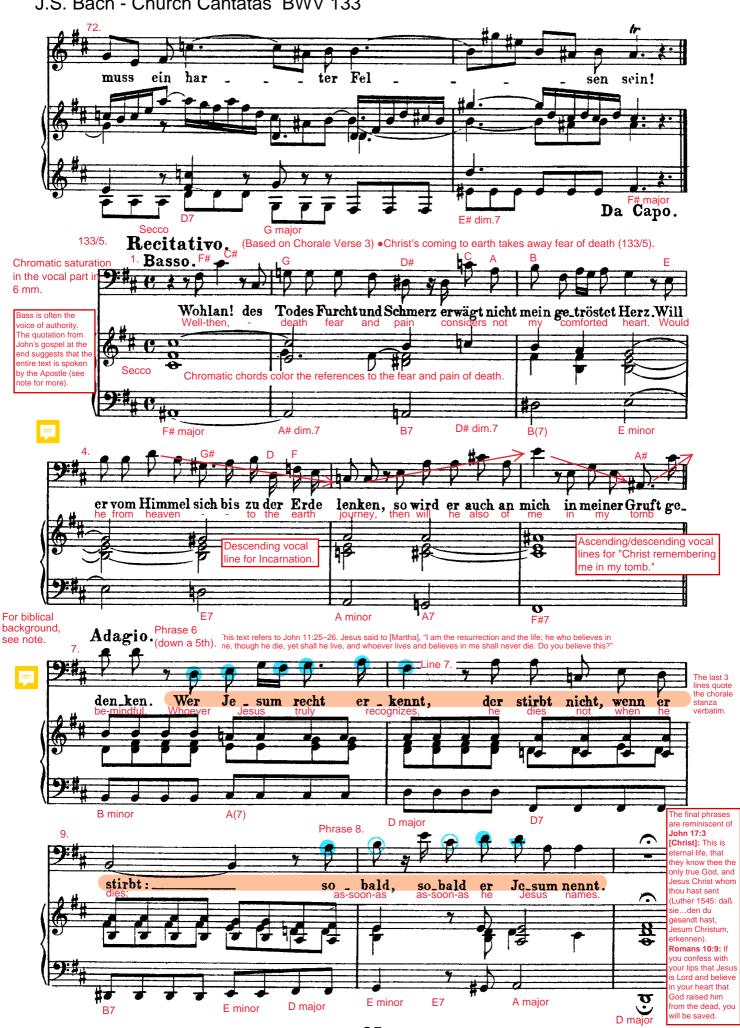
